

# Guidelines to tackle single use plastic products in the Mediterranean

**Target group**: national policymakers and legislators in the signatory countries of the Barcelona Convention

Objective: to provide with a common understanding of the <u>set of</u> <u>measures</u> that can be considered in developing the most appropriate framework to prevent the negative impacts of SUPs, including marine litter generation, and suggest an <u>implementation roadmap</u>



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








Roadmap: a 6 step-by-step approach




- Step 1: Problem definition: **baseline** of SUPs of concern in the country
  - Step 2: Define **policy objectives** and pre-select measures
- Step 3: Conduct an impact assessment
- Step 4: Draft and **adopt** the policy measures
- Step 5: Implement policy and accompanying measures
- Step 6: **Monitor** progress and **review**



## Step 1: Problem definition: baseline of SUPs of concern in the country How plastic n


- Identifying SUPs of concern > verify top SUPs in beach litter
- Analyse sources and pathways
- Current and potential alternatives to SUPs
- Sourcing data (and stakeholders engagement):
  - Production and imports, including growth rates
  - Littering per capita
  - Percentage of products in litter composition
  - Recycling rates
  - Residual waste destinations, including landfill, incineration and informal disposal
- Business-as-usual scenario and scenarios with other policy measures

#### How plastic moves from the economy to the environment



#### **Step 3**: Conduct an impact assessment

- Cost-benefit analysis, which allows for a quantitative assessment
- Qualitative assessment: magnitude and distribution across stakeholders



#### **Step 4**: Draft and adopt the policy measures

- Different **regulatory approaches** when tackling individual SUP or a group of SUPs. Regardless of the choice, key aspects are:
  - Co-existence of measures and progressive, long-term approach
  - Need for by-laws
  - Grouping SUPs per source and pathways
  - Alignment across different institutions
- Stakeholders consultation
- Precise **scope**
- Transparency



### **Step 5**: Implement policy and accompanying measures

- o Information, awareness and education
- o Enhance overall waste management
- o Ensure inter-governmental coordination
- o Ensure a level playing field: standardization and labelling
- o Promote collaboration across the value chain
- Provide incentives to industry and entrepreneurs
- o Implement nationwide potable water/refill systems



#### **Step 6**: Monitor progress and review

- Monitoring system to know how the production, consumption, collection and end-of-life treatment of SUPs and their alternatives evolve over time.
- Marine litter monitoring
- Adapt if policy objectives are not met



## The Single Use Plastic Directive advocacy



### European advocacy to reduce plastic pollution

### Follow the whole legislative process

- The Circular Economy package
- Plastic Strategy
- SUP Directive
- Implementation Acts

### Building advocacy & NGOs' coalition

- → Break Free From plastic & Rethink plastic alliance
- → Join Papers & letters



### The Single Use Directive: European measures against plastic

- **Market restriction**: plastic cotton buds, cutlery, plates, straws, beverage stirrers, polystyrene cups and food and beverage containers, and balloon sticks
- Consumption reduction targets: cups and lids for beverages and food containers
- **Product requirement** : design or composition
- **Marking requirement**: presence of plastic in product for menstrual products, wet wipes, tobacco products, and cups for beverages
- Strengthening Extended Producer Responsibility: cover the costs of collection, transport, treatment, cleaning-up litter and awareness-raising measures for food containers, packets and wrappers, beverage containers (up to 3L) and cups, lightweight plastic carrier bags, wet wipes, balloons, tobacco products and fishing gear
- **Awareness raising:** information about reusable alternatives, reuse systems and waste management options, the resulting environmental impacts of littering for food and beverage containers, wet wipes, tobacco products, sanitary products
- **Separate collection**: 90% of beverage plastic bottles by 2029

## The French Implementation: law anti-waste for circular economy

- Transposition of the EU Single Use Plastic Directive
- Advocacy for more ambitious measures
- Ban of SUP cups
- Ban of SUP in publics events and buildings
- Plastic bottles consumption reduction & water fountains provisions
- Pellets prevention measures
- Microplastic ingredient restriction measures
- Ban of single use plastic packaging by 2040
- 5 years 3R strategy with national objectives for reduction, reuse and recycling



The Single Use Rebellion: monitoring of implementation





Since July 3, some Single Use Plastics have been banned in Europe.

But there are still too many of them.

From September to November Join the Single Use Rebellion S.U.RE!



#### ONE PURPOSE

**Mobilize** and **empower** citizens across Europe to denounce illegal distributions of single-use plastics.





### ONE MISSION

**Take pictures** of banned single-use plastics still in circulation and **report** them back to Surfrider





#### ONE REVEAL

Challenge law-breaking companies and public EU Member-States by revealing the participative data collected by citizens
